Bucks County, Pennsylvania Coroners' Records, 1710–1729

MONG THE RECORDS PRESERVED in the archives of Bucks Λ County is a series of inquisitions held by the county coroners, rsuant to their investigations of sudden, violent or suspicious ths. Seventeen of these documents date from the period 1710-29. Then follows a long gap during which records have not vived. The file resumes in 1786, and the subsequent records are ually rich in information for both the genealogist and the social torian.

Though the earliest actual inquisition surviving is dated 1710, the ice of coroner had existed since the early years of the county, and ere are several references to the coroner's investigation of deaths the court minutes.¹ The first recorded instance was on 12 ptember 1688, when a "Corroners return" was entered in the urt minutes: "A return of the sudden death of Rogr Scott was this y made to this Court under the Jurys hands". Another copy of the urt record said his death was "accidental Through is owne rlesnes".²

Other deaths recorded in the court minutes as coroner's returns:

John Ackerman, 11 June 1690, "drowned accidentely" on 11 May 90.

John Stolon [or Stotton], 10 December 1690, "accidental eath."

Elizabeth Chappel, 8 June 1692, "Casual by falling of her horse into the water or neshaminah Creek."

Richard Atthary [or Athay], 10 March 1696-7, "natural death." James Hagath, servant of John Scot, 13 September 1699, "by a blow of John Snowdons Horse that he struck him the 5th day of the

Place: "at Midletown . . . upon the branch of Neshaminy Creek Near the fford Comonly Called Cartars fford." Report: "in Company with [------W]illiam Graves Rideing

through the sd Creek at the [-----] the sd Rebecca then & there ffell from her Horse [____] she rod Into the sd Creek or water by means whereof [-----] the sd Rebecca was then & there Instantly

Jury: Henry Nelson, Jonathan Woollston, Joseph Walker, Jeremiah Croasdale, Amas Watson, James Yates, Tho. Rogers Junr., Thomas Davis, Peter Vanhorn, William Hudleston, Nathanael Twining, Jonathan Carlile.

Subject: James ffox, "Late of Durham . . . Labourer." Place: "at Durham . . . By Delaware river near a place Comonly Called Monetta Ollack."

Report: "the sd James ffox the Twenty second Day of May ... went into a Certain Creek (Near the sd Monetta Ollack afd) in Company with Divers other persons in order to Bath himself and then & there plunging himselfe so far into the water that It was over his head & he not being able to swim he the sd James ffox was then & there Instantly Drowned."

Subject: Benjamin Lucas, son of Edward Lucas of Falls Township, 'being a Child of one yeare and six months old." Place: "in the fals Township att the hous of Edward Lucas."

Report: "on this 4th day between the hours of Eight and tenn the sd Benj. Lucas was playing neer a Large Spring of Watter that stood in standing water neer 2 foot deep and [accidentally?] fell in to the sd water and was drounded."

Subject: Walter Thomas, "Late of Rights town [Wrightstown] ... Labourer."

Place: "at Rightstown . . . near the house of Richard Mitchell." Report: "on the twenty nineth day of may Last between the hours of Eleven and one of the same day, the sd Walter Thomas into the Miln pond of the sd Richard Mitchell did enter With an intent to wash and bathe himself and being swiming cros the sd miln pond as we suppose was immediately taken with the Cramp of which he sunk down and was drownd."

Subject: Adam Pettet, "Late of makefield, Cooper." Place: "att makefild . . . by Delaware [River?] nere Thomas Yardly ferey."

Report: He "went into the River in Company with Samuell Hough and John Pickren in order to wash and Beath him self then and there plunged him self so far into the water not being able to swim to the shore the water being out of his depth he the sd Adam Pettet was then and there Instentently Drounded."

Subject: John Verity, "Late of Wrightstown aforesaid Weaver."

Place: "at Wrightstown . . . on the Barn floor." Report: "the said John Verity the Twentyeth Day of December ... went into his Barn with a Design to Kill or Chase a Squierel which was in the aforesaid Barn by which means he the said John Verity happened to fall from a mow or scaffold in the Barn afore said upon

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
