My non-published "SUPPLEMENT" to "A QUAKER SAGA", pub. 1967 by Dorrance & Co., Philadelphia, is a hand-typed loose-leaf copy of an original, hand-written manuscript, "WATSON GENEALOGY", researched and arranged by Amos Satterthwaite in Bucks Co., Penna and Sarah M. Fell in Wilmington, Delaware, two recognized 19th-century Quaker genealogists, between the years 1877-1895. My dear elderly cousin Anna S. Palmer had inherited this material and when she knew that I was writing about my mother's family, the Watsons, she presented her inherited material to me in 1963. (Anna S. Palmer died two years ago in her 92nd year of age). This "PART I" of "SUPPLEMENT TO A QUAKER SAGA", consists of 136 typed pages of genealogy, eight pages of notes and 58 pages of index. I have contacted our Philadelphia Yearly Meeting Central Bureau and find that they will be able to xerox this material for you, if you think it is worth having on your files. There are no references noted on these pages but much information that is valuable geographically as well as some five thousand genealogically arranged names for use as guidance in identity.

Those of us who are descended from Thomas & Rebecca(Mark)Watson of "Strawberryhowe", County Cumberland, England, and Oxford, Falls Twp., Bucks County, Pennsylvania, are indebted to our cousin, Anna S. Palmer of Newtown, Bucks County, Pa., for her kindness on November 10, 1963 in presenting this WATSON GENEALOGY copied on the following pages for use as an extension of A QUAKER SAGA, and filed in Historical Libraries.

Inasmuch as the material was the meticulous work of the two late nineteenth century expert Genealogists(also Watson descendants), covering eighteen years of their combined efforts in Bucks County, Pennsylvania and Wilmington, Delaware, it was decided to leave the essential arrangement of their collected notes intact, and, simply as possible copy verbatim, the two hundred and forty pages of hand-written genealogy.

No attempt was made at the time to check nor alter the information contained; however, it is believed that few in any important discrepancies occur, unless present day typographical error has crept in !

The only addition believed necessary was to give each lineal descendant a number designating his or her generation in the particular line of descent from THOMAS & REBECCA(MARK)WATSON, number(1), as first generation. Thus- The Key:

The number before the first name indicates place in family unit.  
The number between a first name and surname indicates generation in descent from 1. Thomas(1)Watson.  
b.-born; d.-died; bur.-buried; m.-married; unmr. -unmarried; dau.-daughter; res.- residence; w.d.- will dated; w.p.- will proved; Tp. or Twp.- Township; Frds.- Friends; M. M.- Monthly Meeting; cem.- cemetery; rec.- records; ch.- children; d.y.- died young; re: -refers to; ref.- reference; n.c.-no children.



All genealogy quoted on pages 3 and 4 has been compared with English Friends' Monthly Meeting records, Bucks County Friends' Monthly Meeting records, Bucks County Court records, Pennsylvania, and found correct, except for differences in spelling a few place and proper names.

Repetition of place names is necessary to help prove each individual's identity. For instance, there are two county Cumberlands, one in England, the other in Pennsylvania; Bucks County, England, Bucks County, Pennsylvania; Middletown Township, Bucks County, Pennsylvania; Middletown, Chester County, Pennsylvania; Middletown, New Jersey; Middletown, New York; Carlisle, County Cumberland, England; Carlisle, Dauphine County, Pennsylvania; Oxford, Chester County, Pennsylvania; Oxford (Oxford Valley), Bucks County, Pennsylvania.

State Archives, County Court records, Deeds, Wills, as well as maps naming roads, rivers, streams, county seats, townships, villages, boroughs and cities are very helpful in identifying people bearing the same name. Occupation, religious affiliation, and (above all) full parentage are also important to add to vital statistics (birth, marriage, death) in proving each person's correct place in the genealogy of the family. Guides to such information are also on the following pages.

When preparing acceptable genealogy by up-to-date standards, accuracy is essential and every fact recorded as such, concerning each individual, should be proved with references noted.

Nevertheless, it is believed that without stated references of proof, the genealogy on the following pages is generally valid, worthy of consideration and of interest to many living, as well as future descendants of the Watsons of Strawberryhow and the Wildmans from England's north counties and lower Bucks County in Pennsylvania.

About 1605 he married a Miss Barnwell and they had a son William Dungan, b. ca. 1606 who married 27th August, 1629, St Martins in the Fields, London, Eng., Frances Latham, bapt, 15th Feb, 1609, dau. of Lewis Latham and his wife, Elizabeth. Clarke became prominent, dying in 1651. Frances Latham, Dungan, Clarke, twice widowed married for her third husband, the Reverend William Vaughn pastor of the first Baptist Church in America. Mrs Frances Vaughn died in 1677 aged 67 years, and buried in Newport, R. I. Church Cemetery.

## KIRKBRIDE FAMILY.

JOSEPH KIRKBRIDE, of Bucks County, was born in Kirkbride, Cumberland County, England, July 29. 1663, died in Falls Township, January 1. 1739. He was the son of Matthew (or Mahlon) and Magdalen Kirkbride, married 1652, of the ancient family of that name in Cumberland, descended from Richard Kirkbride, who married Euphemia, daughter and co-heir of Adam of Levington, Baron of Levington, who died A. D. 1210-11. They have a Coat-of-Arms which is in the form of a Cross.

Joseph Kirkbride arrived in the ship "Welcome" with William Penn in 1682(?) He was a preacher among Friends. He had COLONIAL SERVICE in Bucks County, as JUSTICE OF THE PEACE, March 6. 1708 and in 1722, also as COMMISSIONER, in 1730 and 1734 and was a MEMBER OF ASSEMBLY for five terms from 1698.

He married first, March 14. 1688, Phebe, daughter of Randal (or Randolph) and Alice Blackshaw. Secondly in 1702 Sarah, died 1703, daughter of Mahlon Stacy. ## BLACKSHAW FAMILY.

RUDOLPH BLACKSHAW, of Bucks County, came from Hallingee, Cheshire County, England. He arrived with his wife, Alice, in Maryland, in the Ship "Submission" of Liverpool, November 2. 1682. He removed to Appoquinamine, Pennsylvania, January 15. 1682-3, with his daughter Phebe. On May 9. 1683, his wife and their other children came to Pennsylvania. Their daughter PHEBE married Joseph Kirkbride, March 14. 1688.

## COOPER FAMILY.

WILLIAM COOPER, of Camden, New Jersey, came from Coleshill, Hertfordshire, England and settled with his wife Margaret and five children at Pine Point, now Camden, New Jersey, early in 1679. Some of his descendants married into Bucks County families. His brother was probably, James Cooper, (ancestor of the novelist, James Fennimore Cooper) who settled in Philadelphia in 1683.

William Cooper was born in England in 1632 and died in New Jersey 12. 3. 1709-10.

William Cooper, Sr., was the second resident on the site of Camden, New Jersey. He bought fifty acres and built his first house. He then bought three hundred acres on the Delaware, which is still known as "Cooper's Point" near Cooper's Creek.

He built his second house and established his family on a high bank above Cooper's Point, called by him Pyne Point, from a dense pine forest which grew there. It was a large house and built of brown sand-stone.

William Cooper was present at the treaty of Penn with the Indians in 1682 at Shackamaxon, opposite his house. He had distinguished



COLONIAL SERVICE in New Jersey. He was chosen one of the MEMBERS OF ASSEMBLY from the Third, or Irish Tenth, in 1682-3 and also in 1685. In 1687 he was appointed by the Assembly of the province of the COUNCIL OF PROPRIETORS. He was a COMMISSIONER for the division of lands and in an individual capacity, also acted as attorney for many Friends in England and Ireland in the purchase and location of lands.

In 1694 he was appointed JUDGE of the County Court of Gloucester and continued in that capacity for several years.

His position among Friends is set forth in the testimony issued by the meeting after his death as "having been raised to his gift of exhortation in Hartfordshire, England and lived here in Godly conversation, exercising his gift in the meeting at Newton, wherunto he belonged, to the benefit of God's people, until it pleased God to remove him. As he lived so he died in unity with Friends and in full assurance of his eternal well-being".

## WOOLSTON FAMILY.

JOHN WOOLSTON, of Burlington, New Jersey, came in the "Kent" from <sup>Inthlingborough, Northamptonshire</sup> England and settled at Burlington, New Jersey, with two hundred and thirty others. They landed at Newcastle, Delaware, and came to Burlington, August 26. 1676. Among them was a carpenter, named Marshall, who was very busy in building shelter. At first they lived in wigwams and had mainly to rely upon the Indians for food, who supplied them with corn and venison.

The first house built was a frame one owned by John Woolston. Friends' Meetings was held under a sailcloth tent. The town was first called New Beverly, then Bridlington, and later changed to Burlington. He became one of the Proprietors of New Jersey.

John Woolston married Hannah, daughter of William and Margaret Cooper, at Burlington Monthly Meeting, in 1681. He died 3. 3. 1692. Their children were:

They all attended the Pine Street Monthly Meeting.

"amongst us the People called Quakers, but for want of keeping  
"up the peaceable Principle we profess, he hath so far devi-  
"ated as to be guilty of taking up Arms and joining a Military  
"Body of Men and we can have no Unity with him, until he be-  
"comes rightly sensible of his error."

"There appears a neglect amongst us in the attendance  
 "of our week Day Meeting; the Hour is nearly kept to by most that  
 "do meet; some care is taken to admonish such as appear Drowsy

 "courage Talebearing and Backbiting and to try and end differences
