"Ralph Hunt served long as a town surveyor and as an overseer; and during the reoccupation by the Dutch held the office of schepen or magistrate. He died early in 1677, leaving sons Ralph, Edward, John, and Samuel, and daughters Ann and Mary, the former then the wife of Theophilus Phillips. Of the sons, Ralph and Samuel settled in Jamaica, L.I. John was a magistrate in Newtown for some years, and left a son Ralph, and perhaps others. Edward became a man of estate, and died in Newtown in 1716, having five sons and as many daughters, to wit, Edward born February 4th 1684, Richard, Ralph, Thomas, Jonathan, Sarah, Martha, Elizabeth, Hannah, and Abigail. The two sons last named continued in Newtown, but Edward and Richard settled in Hunterdon County, N.J." -James Riker, The Annals of Newtown, Queens County, N.Y., 1852, page 85. The following documented report verifies the above statements and continues the lines of descent through the eighth generation in ^{some} ~~many~~ cases. The Will of Ralph Hunt of Newtown, Queens Co., N.Y., dated 12 January 1676/7; Codicil dated 13 January 1676/7; and the administration granted 26 February 1676/7 to son Edward Hunt; states "It is my will to have my son Edward sole executor, and he is to give to his other three brothers, as they come of age, (not named) their portions by equal divisions." . . .  was
 N.Y.,/of the adjacent town of Jamaica, with wife Susanna, when
 they gave Deeds in 1686 and in 1692, (Jamaica Town Records, publ.
 1914, vol. 1: 394 and 385); removed thence to Maidenhead Township
 (now Lawrence), Burlington (now Mercer) County, N.J., by 1694^{*/}, and
 with his wife Susanna gave a Deed there dated 16 October 1700, (NJA
 1st series, 21: 536). By Deed of 8 June 1711, Ralph Hunt and Benjamin

And, by Deed of 7 March 1725, John Hunt and wife Joanna, of Newtown, L.I., conveyed a tract of 100 acres there to William Howard, (Newtown Town Records); The Census of Newtown, taken in August 1698, listed John Hunt as head of a family of seven, (AG 23: 133). One "Johannah Hunt, widow" was admitted to membership in the Presbyterian Church of Hopewell, Hunterdon County, N.J., on 31 August 1733, possibly widow of this John Hunt. The four sons of this couple are identified by cross references in their Wills.

128. ^{5/}DAVID HUNT, born in 1747, son of no. 44 James and Rachel (Wood) Hunt, of Hopewell Township, Hunterdon County, N.J.; died 11 April 1817. He married a daughter of Jonathan Stout, of Hopewell. She was born in 1749, and died 21 February 1834, (Pioneers of Old Hopewell, 1908, p. 102). The estate of David Hunt is not found in the probate records of Hunterdon County; nor are gravestones for this couple found in either the Baptist or the Presbyterian Churchyards of Hopewell.
