Ralph Hunt served long as a town surveyor and as an overseer; and during the reoccupation by the Dutch held the office of schepen or magistrate. He died early in 1677, leaving sons Ralph, Edward, John, and Samuel, and daughters Ann and Mary, the former then the wife of Theophilus Phillips. Of the sons, Ralph and Samuel settled in Jamaica, L.I. John was a magistrate in Newtown for some years, and left a son Halph, and perhaps others. Edward became a man of estate, and died in Newtown in 1716, having five sons and as many daughters, to wit, Edward born February 4th 1684, Richard, Ralph, Thomas, Jonathan, Sarah, Martha, Elizabeth, Hannah, and Abigail. The two sons last named continued in Newtown, but Edward and Richard settled in Hunterdon County, N.J." -James Riker, The Annals of Newtown, Queens County, N.Y., 1852, page 85. The following documented report verifies the above statements and continues the lines of descent some through the eighth generation in meny cases. Society, Colonial Dames of America, 1928, p. 415. The Will of Ralph Hunt of Newtown, Queens Co., N.Y., dated 12 January 1676/7; Codicil dated 13 January 1676/7; and the administration granted 26 February 1676/7 to son Edward Hunt; states "It is my will to have my son Edward sole executor, and he is to give to his other three brothers, as they come of age, (not named) their portions by equal divisions." . . . "As for my daughter Anna's three children, I give to each of them a sheep" . . . "Captain Betts and John Burroughs to be overseers! Codicil: "My daughter Anna shall have as good a portion with that she hath already as any of the rest of my children. And as for the red coat she now has in possession, it is to be valued and one-half given to my daughter Mary" -Abstracts of Wills filed in the Surrogate's Office, N.Y.C., published in Collections of the N.Y. Historical Society, 1892, page 40. The name of the wife, or wives, whotevidently pre-deceased the testator Ralph Hunt has not been recovered here. The Records of the Presbyterian Church of Lawrenceville existing since the loss by fire, are of the years 1807-1865, published by the N.J. Society Colonial Dames of America, in 1941, Indexed. It contains Names, Admissions and Dismissals, Baptisms 1821-1849. The Gravestone Inscriptions in the Churchyard copied and published in the <u>Genealogical Magazine of N.J.</u>, 1959, vol. 31, pages2-10.

JOHN HUNT, son of Ralph Hunt, died after 1725, either in his 13 native Newtown, Queens County, L.I., N.Y., if he did not remover. with his sons to Hopewell Township, Hunterdon County, N.J., but in either event the year of his death is not recovered here, as the probate on his estate is not of record. By Deed of 4 June 1714, Alexander Lockhart of Hopewell Township, abovesaid, conveyed to John Hunt of Newtown, L.I., a tract of 500 acres in said Hopewell, bounded East by Stony Brook, North by Samuel Davis, West by Captain Hannet, and South ny Johannes Lawrenson, recorded in West Jersey Dedd Book BBB, p. 154. He was commissioned Ensign of the Maidenhead Militia Company commanded by his uncle, Capt. Philip Phillips, on 18 March 1714/15; a Justice of the Peace of Hunterdon County on 20 September 1725, and on 10 February 1727/8, and on 26 September 1734; and one of the twelve Burgesses in the charter of the Borough of Trenton including Maidenhead and Hopewell, on 6 September 1746, (PGM 7: 240, 8: 150 and 240, 9: 114 and 227); and was appointed a Judge of Common Pleas on 28 March 1749, (NJA 16: 91). #John Bainbridge of Maidenhead, 1658-1733, in his Will Devised "To my loving kinsman and appointed him one of two execrs., Theophilus Phillips" five Pounds A(NJA 23: 30; AG 32: 98), but the relationship has evaded recovery for this report. The term "kinsman" securate indicates some blood relation, galike "cousin" which meant nephew in modern terms, as "son" meaning son-in-law. Possibly, it was through Phillips' mother Frances, whose surname remains unknown. I The Will of Theophilus Phillips of Maidenhead, Hunterdon Co., N.J., yeoman, dated 29 May 1761 and proved 18 February 1762, devises to wife Abigail all the estate I had with her, also many goods, meat and grain, and $1\frac{1}{4}$ acres of land; to son Richard 25 Pounds; to son John the like amount; to son William 75 Pounds; to daughter Frances Bainbridge 50 Pounds; to son William all my lands below the road; legacies to son Joseph's youngest children viz. Elizabeth, Hezekiah, Mary, and Joseph; to grandson Theophilus Moore 10 Pounds; to grandgaughter Keziah Moore 5 Pounds; to grand-daughter Elizabeth Moore 10 Pounds; to grandson Theophilus Phillips, son of Joseph deceased, the lands above the road, when he is age 20, and he is to pay to his sisters Elizabeth Phillips and Mary Phillips, 15 Pounds each; and appoints sons John and William the executors. Witnesses: Ralph Hunt, John Bainbridge, Abner Phillips, (-NJA 33: 328). For a transcript in

full, see The Rev. John Moore of Newtown, L.I., page 179.

The register of the Church of England Parish of Jamaica, L.I., contains this item: "Theophilus Phillips of Hopswell, East Jersey, and Elizabeth Betts, of thos parish, Nov. 9, 1714 at Newtown, published, (NYGBR 19: 54). This first wife was a daughter of Richard Betts, of Newtown, L.I., who died testate on 4 November 1711, (Ibid. 19: 58). His second wife, Abigail, named in Theophilus Phillips' Will of 29 May 1761, has not been/indextined for this report. She was probably the Abigail Phillips who, with Sarah Phillips and John Bainbridge, signed as witnesses to the Will of no. 104 John Hunt of Maidenhead Township, dated 6 September 1758, (NJA 32: 170). She was certainly not the Abigail Betts, sister of his first wife Elizabeth Betts, as stated in F.B. Lee, Genealogical and Personal Memorial of Mercer County, N.J., 1907; page 77, for she is of record as married to maxx30 Samuel Hunt of Hopewell Township, Hunterdon County, N.J., on 1 November 1720, and as having survived him and died testate in 1769, as see no. 30 hereinbefore.
