Job remained with his hai parents at Fedbank, Benjamin, (1747 - 1797) married Elisabeth Hopper. who died, according to the Diary, in 1808. The Diary is as follows; "Elisabeth Mhitall, widow of Benjamin and mother of Joseph and Samuel, deceased to-day. 2. II. I808." There is another entry in the Diary, dated I2/6/I804. as follows, "Sarah Whitall, wife of Samuel, daughter of Joseph Ellis, deceased." From these two entries, I deduce the following: Benjamin Whatall married Elisabeth Hopper. They had two sons, Joseph and Samuel. Samuel married Sarah daughter of Soeeph Ellis. They had a son, Joseph Ellis Whitall, who brught - Bellene in 1841. Side lights in an old letter written by Sarah, dister of m our grandfather, John Whatall, shows they had a cousin in Maryland who is not named, but I feel sure it was Samuel, How he ever got ・イイ to Maryland, and rented "Belleview", I do not know. Benjamin Whitall and John S. Whitall, Grandfather of your husband and myself, were brothers. Samuel was therefore our Grand-No father's first cousin. The relationships therefore fade away into A more and more distant cousinships.

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I hope I have not everlastingly mixed you up. Your inquiry came just as I was going over some old Whitall letters, and it has amused me to pick this out. There is a great repitition of names, and innumerable Sarah Whitalls, so to find who is who is difficult. I am enclosing to you a picture of Thomas W. Whitall as a little a

I have dong chine her this ficture. boy. I was very fond of him as he was a charming boy, but his brother John was near er to me in age and my particular intimate in those early days. There are few now living who can share these early memories. You may have a duplicate of this picture, but perhaps one of your sons may value it. I am now seventy four, and feel the time has come for me to dispose of old pictures and letters which will not mean anything to younger generations. I have just completed an account of Sbeneser Mopkins, the adopted nephew of Elizabeth Baddon Estaugh, the founder of Baddonfield, New Jersey. His dates are 1718 - 1757. He was my ancestor great qualinsthe Sarah Triciale -un Hopens nicholson through my mother and more dire ctly through my father, He was of course your childrens' ancestor also. The Battle of Red bank occurred on the afternoon of October 22, 1777, when approximately 400 Continental troops and local militiamen, led by Colonel Christopher Greene, in Fort Mercer successfully repelled a strong attack by over 2000 professional Hessian solders under Count Carl Emil Van Donop.

The disastrous British defeat was compounded the following day by the loss of the 64-gun ship <u>AUGUSTA</u> and the sloop <u>Merlin</u>.

This valiant defense of the Delaware, coupled with Washington's aggressive attack at Germantown and Burgoyne's surrender at Saratoga, prompted quick entry of the French into the conflict, which eventually resulted in a free America.



CHEVAUX-DE-FRISE

Congress charged Robert Smith, a Philadelphia architect and carpenter, with the task of blocking the Delaware River against British ships. A system of chevaux-de-frise was developed. These consisted of a series of iron spikes supported just below the level of the water set so as to ` impale or impede ships sailing upstream. The iron spikes were mounted on heavy timbers that were mounted at an angle on large wooden boxes. The boxes could be floated into position in the Delaware and then filled with twenty to forty tons of stone to sink and anchor them in place. Each box supported two or three points, and each set of points had to be especially designed for the depth where it would be placed. The chevaux-de-frise were placed strategically and across the river, and a few river pilots were given their location so they could safely guide the American vessels in the river.

The first of these troops organized was under the authority of the Provincial Congress, Feb. 13, 1776, and consisted of two artillery companies, one to be stationed in the eastern and one in the western division of the State. These batteries took part in the battles of Trenton, Assunpink, Princeton, and Monmouth.

Frederick Frelinghuysen was appointed captain of the eastern company. The officers of the western company were

The plan was still further considered and amended Aug. 16, 1775. After that date all officers were ordered to be commissioned by the Provincial Congress or the Committee of Safety. In the assignment then made Gloucester had three battalions, Salem one regiment, and Cumberland two battalions.

"Minute-men" having been raised in some other counties, in compliance with the recommendation of the Continental Congress, the Provincial Congress, by this ordinance, ordered the several counties to furnish them, ranging from one to eight companies each. The assignment for Gloucester was four companies, Salem three, and Cumberland three. These companies of minute-men were "held in readiness on the shortest notice to march to any place where assistance might be required for the defense of this or any neighboring colony." They were to continue in service four months. Their uniform was a hunting-frock, similar to that of the riflemen in the Continental service. On the 3d of June, 1776, the Continental Congress called for thirteen thousand eight hundred militia to reinforce the army at New York. The quota for New Jersey under this call was three thousand three hundred, of which Gloucester, Salem, and Cumberland Counties furnished each two companies. Nov. 27, 1776, the Provincial Congress passed the first act for the organization of the infantry branch of the State troops. This act provided for the organization, by voluntary enlistment, of four battalions of eight companies each. Of these battalions, one was raised in the counties of Gloucester, Salem, and Cumberland, consisting of three companies from Gloucester, three from Salem, and two from Cumberland. Of this battalion, David Potter was appointed colonel, Whitton Cripps lieutenant-colonel, and William Ellis major.

Colonel, Silas Newcomb; Lieutenant-Colonel, Bowes Reed; Major, William Ellis; Quartermaster, Abijah Holmes; Surgeon, Thomas Ewing; Surgeon's Mate, Robert Patterson; and Chaplain, Philip Vickers Fithian.

Oct. 9, 1779, four thousand volunteers were called for, to serve till Dec. 20, 1779. Of these the quota of Gloucester, Salem, Cumberland, and Cape May Counties was one regiment of eight companies, each company numbering one hundred and two men. Of this regiment, Nicholas Stilwell was appointed colonel, Robert Brown lieutenant-colonel, and Anthony Sharp major.

Dec. 29, 1781, a call was made for four hundred and twenty-two men, to serve till Dec. 15, 1782. Under this call the company from Gloucester County was commanded by Capt. Simon Lucas, that from Salem by Capt. Nicholas Keen, and that from Cumberland by Capt. Charles Allen. These companies were ordered to do "duty on land or water."

Calls were also made June 7 and 14, 1780, for four hundred and twenty men, each to serve till Jan. 1, 1782.

Militia.—On the 3d of June, 1775, the Provincial Congress of New Jersey passed an act providing a "plan for regulating the militia of the colony." This

July 16, 1776, the Continental Congress requested the Convention of New Jersey to supply with militia the places of two thousand men of Gen. Washington's army that had been ordered into New Jersey to form the flying camp. Of the thirty companies of sixtyfour men each sent under this call, Gloucester fur nished three companies, and Cumberland one, which, with three companies from Burlington, were under Col. Charles Read, Lieut.-Col. Josiah Hillman, Maj. William Ellis, and Surgeon Bodo Otto, Jr. Salem supplied two companies, which, with three each from Middlesex and Monmouth, formed a battalion that was officered by Col. Samuel Forman, Lieut.-Col. Whitton Cripps, and Maj. John Dunn.

Aug. 11, 1776, one-half of the militia was ordered to be detached for immediate service, to be relieved by the other half every month. On this basis of monthly classes, in active service alternate months, the militia were held during the war.

EDUCATIONAL.

"Woodbury Academy was erected in 1791, the money with which to build being raised by lottery, which was quite a common way at that time of raising money for such purposes. The land upon which it was built was deeded the same year by Joseph Bloomfield, of Burlington (who from 1803 to 1812 was Governor of the State), to Rev. Andrew Hunter, Dr. Thomas Hendry, John Sparks, Benjamin Whitall, Franklin Davenport, John Blackwood, and Joseph Howell, in trust, for the sole purpose of building an academy upon. It had at first but one story, with the present belfry upon it. "Rev. Andrew Hunter, one of the trustees, and minister of the Presbyterian congregation at that time, was the first teacher. In 1820 the second story was put on, and used for academic purposes, and the lower story, which had been used for some years by the Presbyterian congregation as a place of worship, as well as for a school, was conveyed to them, and fitted up for church purposes, and dedicated on the 19th of March of the same year by Rev. Jonathan Freeman, George W. Janvier, and Thomas J. Briggs, and continued to be used as a place of worship till 1834.

REVOLUTIONARY WAR.

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FERSEYMEN IN THE

1776, the Eastern Company was annexed to Colonel Thomas Proctor's regiment of artillery, Continental Army, and assigned to General Knox's brigade of artillery. By reason of this assignment these batteries are often referred to as Continental troops.
