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REYNIER TYSON

On March 10, 1682, William Penn, Proprietary of Pennsylvania, conveyed to Jacob Telner, a resident of Crefeld, but also a merchant of Amsterdam, Jan Streypers, a merchant of Kaldenkirchen, a village in the vicinity of Crefeld even nearer Holland, and Dirck Sipman of Crefeld, each 5,000 acres of land to be laid out in Pennsylvania.

On June 11, 1683, Penn conveyed to Govert Remke, Lenart Arets and Jacob Van Bebber, all of Crefeld, 1,000 acres each, and they with Telner, Streypers and Sipman, constituted the six original purchasers of the site of Germantown who were pledged to Penn to send a certain number of colonists to that locality.

Very soon thereafter thirteen men, some with families, comprising in all thirty-three persons, nearly all of them relatives, from Crefeld and vicinity, went over from Rotterdam to London, whence through James Claypoole, the Quaker merchant of the latter city, they obtained passage in the ship Concord of 500 tons burden, which left England July 24, 1683, and arrived in Philadelphia October 6, 1683.

From the interesting letter-book of James Claypoole, William Penn's intimate friend, we learn that among the passengers on the Concord, which was boarded at Gravesend for Philadelphia, there were "33 Dutchmen" from Crefeld. Writing June 15, 1683, from London to Benjamin Furley, Claypoole said:

"I have according to thy order of wch I advised in my last agreed positively with Capt. Jefferies, Master of the Concord, for the passage of the 33 Dutchmen."

Writing from Philadelphia, Dec. 2, 1683, to his brother Edward, Claypoole says "As to our voyage from England to this place, we went on board the Concord at Gravesend the 24, 5 Mo. and after we lost sight of England wch was in about three weeks time we were 49 days before we saw land in America, and the 1st 8 Mo. some of us went ashore in Pennsylvania; the blessing of the Lord did attend us so that we had a very comfortable passage and our health all the way."

The 33 "Dutchmen" or Germans who constituted a considerable portion of the passenger-list of the Concord comprised the following thirteen men and their families: Lenart Arets, Johannes Bleikers, Peter Keurlis, Thones Kunders, Jan Lensen, Jan Lücken, Abraham Op den Graeff, Dirck Op den Graeff, Herman Op den Graeff, Jan Seimens, Willem Streypers, Abraham Tunes, and Reynier Tyson.

These were practically all, as their names show, of the Holland stock and though living within the borders of the Palatinate, were not Palatinates, such as constituted the bulk of the later German emigration to Pennsylvania. This was not a peasant race like those later Palatinate emigrants, but a free burgher stock akin to that which first settled New Netherland, and before this had held sway on the Delaware River. Neither were these men mere artisans, as many too hasty writers aver, but, in the proportion of their time, manufacturers and employers of labor. Certain record-searchers finding the style "weaver" affixed to some of their deeds, wills, etc., and forgetting that such documents

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in those times drew no distinction between master and man, have represented them in the humblest capacity, but deeper study of their affairs show them to have been the true prototypes of the great textile manufacturers of to-day. Many of them have been proven descended from families high in church or state or in that scholastic class held in high honor in Teutonic medieval Europe.

Among the younger men of this little party of venturesome immigrants was Reynier Tyson. His family connection with the other colonists was through his sister who was the wife of Jan Streypers, one of the six original purchasers mentioned above. Willem Streypers, one of the colonists, was brother to Jan, and the wives of Thones Kunders and Lenart Arets were sisters to Jan and Willem. Moreover, the three Op den Graeffs were cousins to the Streyper brothers while Herman Op den Graeff's wife was a daughter of Jacob Isaacs Van Bebber, one of the original purchasers. Thus the connection ran through the whole band.

(William I. Hull, "William Penn & the Dutch Quakers" Appendix C, says: Lenart Arets with his wife Agnistan (Agniscan), a sister of Willem Streypers and of Thones Kunders's wife, Johannes Bleikers, wife had son Peter at sea on the Concord. Peter Keur's wife Elisabeth, inn-keeper, probably the first beer-brewer in America. Thones Kunders; wife Liintjen (Elin) Teissen, sister of Reynier; Jan Lensen, (Jho. Lenson); Jan Lucken, wife Maria Teissen, their daughter Alice later m John Cunrad, son of Thones Kunders, another daughter Hannah later m John Samuel Pastorius, son of Francis Daniel Pastorius; the Opden Graeffs, their mother died in Philadelphia enroute to the Germantown settlement, the four children: (1) Abraham with his wife, Catharina (Trijntje), (2) Derick with his wife, Neeltje, (3) Herman with his wife Liesbet Isaacks van Bebber, and (4) Margrit, who later m Peter Schumacher III in Gntn; Jan Seimens died early and his widow re-married in 1685; Willem Streypers, his daughter Catherine, later married Henry Cunrad, son of Thones Kunders; Abraham Tunes, wife; Reynier Teissen, wife Margaret; his younger brother, Derick, died unmarried.)

Writing to his parents in Germany, Pastorius, on March 7, 1684, says that there were already 42 people living in 12 homes in Germantown. This would imply that there were 34 Crefelders in 9 or 10 houses and they had been joined by two or three other German families with their eight members.)

Reynier Tyson was named in Penn's charter of August 12, 1689, as one of the original incorporators of the Borough of Germantown, and he served as Burgess in 1692, 1693, 1694, and 1696. He was a member of a Coroner's jury summoned by Coroner James de la Plaine on 4mo. 24, 1701. On March 1, 1700/1 he bought of John Colley 250 acres of land in Abington Twp. and soon after went there to live and continued there the rest of his life. This farm is located about a mile south-east of Fitzwatertown and adjoined the lands of John Kirk, Capt. John Rush and others, and it comprised one-half of a tract of 500 acres patented to Israel Hobbs, Aug. 4, 1684, which Colley had purchased Mar. 27, 1699.

Reynier is said to have been first a Mennonite, but seems to have become a member of the Society of Friends before leaving Germany, for a memorial to him in The Friend, Philadelphia, 1857, vol. XXX, page 229, says: "Reynier Tyson was born in Germany in or about the year 1659. He was convinced of the Truth whilst living there, and for his faithfulness thereto, suffered persecution. He removed to Pennsylvania a few years after William Penn first obtained the province, and he settled within the limits of Abington M. Mtg., then called Dublin. He continued faithful to the manifestations of Truth received, and grew in the esteem of his friends to a father in the church. In the year 1725 he was appointed elder and continued faithful in fulfilling the duties of the station until prevented by age and indisposition. His friends say:

'He was innocent and inoffensive in life and conversation, and diligent in attending his religious meetings'. He lived beloved and honored to a good old age, dying on the 27th day of the Seventh month, 1745; aged about 86 years."

He was one of the signers of the address issued by the Quarterly Meeting of Philadelphia to London Yearly Meeting, which Samuel Jennings bore with him to London in 1693, concerning the Keith controversy which rent the Society of Friends asunder. Germantown, where he first settled, as well as his later residence in Abington Twp., was within the compass of Abington Monthly Meeting, so that all his efforts in religious affairs were accomplished within this body. Some reference to Reynier Tyson in the M.Mtg. minutes are worth reproducing as indicative of the spirit of the age.

April 29, 1695.- "It is agreed upon at this meeting that four friends belonging to this M.Mtg. be appointed to take care of ye youth, belonging to each Meeting, as Concerning their orderly walking, as becomes ye truth they make profession of; according to the good advice of friends in an Epistle from ye Yearly Meeting at Burlington 1694; wherefore Richard Wall is appointed for Cheltenham, Richard Whitefield for Oxford, John Carver for ye upper township and Ryner Tyson for Ger-town."

February 24, 1695/6.- "Whereas this Meeting having taken into Consideration ye good advice of friends in an Epistle from ye Yearly Meeting to put in practice their Council to admonish those yt profess Gods Truth, and do not walk answerable thereunto. This Meeting have Chosen Richard Whitefield & Edmund Orphood, to inspect into Oxford Meeting, Ryner Tyson and Arnold Clinkin to inspect into Germantown Meeting," etc.

July 26, 1725.- "Whereas It hath been Desired and thought Expedient that one More Elder belonging to each Particular Meeting Should Attend those Meetings When friends of ye Ministry Do Meet In order thereunto Ye Meeting have Made Choice of Ryner Tyson For Abington, Thos. Roberts for Germantown, John Duncan for Bybery."

In Tyson's day Abington Monthly Meeting belonged to Philadelphia Quarterly Meeting. He was appointed by the former as a representative to the latter August 26, 1695; May 25, 1696; February 26, 1698/9; February 27, 1709/10; August 29 and October 31, 1715; January 30, 1720/1; and October 28, 1722.

He was appointed an Overseer of Abington Particular Meeting March 25, 1706/7 for "this next year", and again October 20, 1709. On January 1719/20, the minute say: "Abington friends have chosen Reice Peters Overseer in the room of Ryner Tyson." He was again appointed as Overseer January 27, 1723/4 for the ensuing year.

On May 7, 1691, Thomas Lloyd, Deputy Governor of the Province, granted naturalization papers to 64 of the first inhabitants of Germantown. Included were all the original thirteen heads of families. In 1709, twenty-six of these survived to be re-naturalized with fifty-seven new colonists. Hull, Appendix C.

Reynier Tyson was a single man when he came to America, but about two years after his arrival (his first child, Matthias, having been born June 30, 1686), he married Margaret, said by Mackenzie in his Colonial Families of the United States, to have been Margaret Kunders, probably a sister of Thomas Kunders, and that they had all come over together in the Concord, but he does not give his authority for this statement: In a little book entitled "Recollections of Charles Kirk, late of Warminster, Pennsylvania. An Elder in the Society of Friends. Written in his seventy-ninth year", he says: "John Kirk was my ancestor who came from Derbyshire, England, and bought 500 acres of land in Upper Darby. His second son, John, located in Abington Twp. He married Sarah, daughter of Reynier Tyson. I recollect hearing him (This must be Reynier Kirk 1725-1799 grandfather of Charles W. Kirk 1788-1870) relate that his (i.e. Reynier's) grandfather, Reynier Tyson, was not married when he first came to this country, and being disposed to marry his first cousin and our Discipline not allowing it, they made preparation to go back to Germany to accomplish their marriage, but Friends seeing their sincerity allowed them to proceed." [The part above in parentheses is interpretation by H.T. Lukens. Mr. Samuel Traquar Tyson continues as follows.] In looking over the Strieper Papers in the Document Room of The Penna. Historical Society I recently found a number of copies of letters written by Reynier to his Cousins in Kaldenkirchen in regard to various business. They were addressed as followed "Dear Cousins Lenert and Heinrich Striepers with your sister: I greet you and hope this will find you in health etc. etc X X X (relating to business matters)

(Signed) Reynier Tyssen

From this I would infer that the Margaret that Reynier married was a Striepers instead of a Kunders as Mackenzie asserts; that Reynier's wife's name was Margaret is confirmed by an abstract of title as follows: "Whereas, Reynier Tyson of Abington Twp., yeoman, and Margaret, his wife, by deed, 5-15-1727, granted to their son, Isaac Tyson, a tract of land in Abington Twp. containing by computation 250 acres of land, etc. Recorded in Deed Book I, page 416. This was the same tract that Reynier had purchased from John Colley in 1700/01. It is further to be noted that Reynier's first born, Matthias, named his first child, a daughter, Margaret, presumably after her grandmother, and of Reynier's nine children six gave the name Margaret to a daughter.

REYNIER TYSON'S LAND HOLDINGS

In the drawing for lots which took place in the river bank case of Pastorius, Reynier Tyson drew No. 5. He had purchased 50 acres in the Gntn twp. and lot No. 5 was laid out along the east side of the Main Street of Gntn, extending southwardly from where Bringham street has since been opened. It reached in front along the highway 231 feet and extended back to the twp-line. It contained about 18 acres and undoubtedly his first home was erected on this lot. To the north of him was the home lot of Leonard Arets, from whom he had bought, and next toward the city was the lot of Jan Lucken. (The map in History of Old Germantown, page 43, shows No. 4 south of No. 5 and No. 6, Jan Lucken, north of Bringham st.)

Toward his 50 acres he was also given the corresponding No. 5 of the "Side lots toward Bristol", which contained 22 acres, lying just north of the present Washington Lane, and extending from the present Chew St. to Stenton Ave, which was the township line. (See Keyser's Old Gntn., page 48). To complete the 50 acres there were 18 3/4 acres "broad thirteen perches and twelve feet" in the side lands toward Plymouth betwixt the said inhabited part and the land of Jonas Potts. (This seems to make 58 3/4 acres instead of 50 acres)

This land Tyson held by virtue of a deed of sale from Leonard Arets, a first purchaser of 250 acres. The deed was dated October 10, 1683, and acknowledged in open court in Germantown, held 8mo. 8, 1692. These three tracts Tyson sold in 1708 to Isaac Van Sintern, weaver of Philadelphia, for 100 L. Philada. Deed Book E. 5 vol. 7, page 78.

Reynier Tyson as he prospered bought other lands in Germantown.

(1st) Two parcels of land adjacent one to the other, being both in breadth 14P & 4ft. and in length 114 P & 15ft., being bounded S-E with the lot once of Jno. Streipers and now Reynier Tison, W. with the land of the liberties of the City of Philadelphia, and N. with the lot formerly of Herman op den Graeff and E. with the 11 acres of Dirck op den Graeff. Bought Nov. 20, 1692, and Nov. 13, 1683, and sold to John Henry Kuston, April 30, 1709.

(2d) Two other pieces: "One situated in the inhabited part of the said town, being the very first lot of the same on the west side, containing 23 1/2 acres making both 50 acres. Bought of the Trustees of John Streipers, Crefeld, Germany, March 1, 1702/3, confirmed in open court in Gntn. 12mo. 8, 1703/4. Sold April 30, 1709, to John Henry Kuston. Philada. Deed Book E 5, vol. 7, p. 205.

(3d) Two tracts in Crefeld in the German Twp., 50 acres of which he bought of Herman op den Graeff 3mo. 1684, and 66 acres likewise in Crefeld which he bought of Dirck op den Graeff, 9mo. 27, 1683. These were sold to William Strepers, "Leather Dresser", for 35L. January 16, 1699. Recorded G 10 page 301.

REYNIER TYSON MOVES to ABINGTON

On Holmes Great Map of 1684, in the section which is easily identified as the modern Abington Twp., is a 500-acre tract extending from the Cheltenham Twp. line to the Susquehanna St. Road and labeled "Isaac Hobbs". This is roughly described as being along certain lines of marked trees 480P, just a mile and a half in length and 167P or a little over one-half mile in width. This was patented to Hobbs in 1684. Patent Book A Vol. 1, page 259.

This tract Hobbs sold in 1699 to John Colley, a hatter of Philadelphia, and he in the following year sold the half of it lying next to Cheltenham Twp. to Reynier Tyson of Gntn., Yeoman. (Penna Archives, Second Series, Vol. XIX, Minute Book "G" p. 423)

Just when Reynier Tyson moved from Gntn. to Abington is not clear. It was not until 1708 and 1709 that he sold his home and the considerable other property he had acquired in the Germantown Twp. and the presumption would be that he moved to Abington about that time. He continued to live on his Abing-

ton farm the remainder of his years. His family became closely identified with the social life of Abington Meeting and most of his children intermarried with the members and attenders of that Meeting.

In 1727 he and his wife Margaret conveyed the Abington farm to their son Isaac, reserving to themselves, in the quaint language of the deed, "One room, commonly called the stove room, and also the kitchen, and free ingress and egress to the rest of the rooms in the said messuage, during the remainder of their lives." This home farm descended from Isaac to his son Isaac (See Partit proceedings, Orphans Court, June 11, 1770), and again to an Isaac and his sister Sarah, who in 1830 sold it out of the family to Samuel Schofield. This land may be roughly identified as lying north of the Germantown and Willow Grove Turnpike (or the Plank Road), and extending from the Cheltenham Twp. line on the NW to the road leading from Jenkintown to Fitzwatertown, called in some of the deeds, the Jenkintown Road, on the southwest. The growing village of Glenside was spread over its western portion, and the old property lines have long since disappeared. The land lay gently to the south on the lower slopes of Edgemoor, and is underlaid with limestone. The lime which was used to build the State House in Philadelphia is said to have come from kilns on the Tyson place, whether this or some other later Tyson farm in Abington, I cannot say. A little stream crosses it southwestwardly, flowing eventually into Frankford Ch.

In the tax list of 1734 are the following assessments in Abington Twp.

Dear Mr. Lukens:

I am afraid that you will be disappointed in the data which I am able to add to that which you already had. As I have no copy of that which I sent you relating to the Webster line, I am at a loss to recall the generation which I promised to copy for you; but if you find anything on the notes; and I think that you will, which gives a clue to others not included in the line which you sent me, I will be very glad to look the book over again. As it stands I believe that you have all which is given in the Shoemaker Genealogy.

I trust that you can read correctly the faint lines in pencil on the chart. I had in view an easy erasure, if you were to use this as an original.

Miss Caroline Taylor, 5121, lives with her brother's two boys, in Pasadena. She tells me that Miss Mary Shoemaker, of Lincoln, Virginia, and living in the Janney homestead, is much interested in genealogy, and would give you data; 5134. The three sisters are unmarried. She herself has no data beyond that which she has given me. From Miss Mary you can learn whether or not her deceased sister's name was Janney. Dorothy, 51421, in a letter, spells her name, Mc.Diarimid, and he is said to be the son of Adrimal Mc.Diarimid. This can be learned from the library records, and the spelling confirmed. 53a7 you have Carrean, while Shoemaker gives it as Correen. The latter is the pronunciation given to her name by Corinne Tyson. I am unfamiliar with the name. Others I have marked in quotation marks, as coming from Shoemaker. He is not a sure one to follow; and he side-steps the full middle names. Please express any doubts, laconically, on a postal and I will reply at once, to the best of my ability.

Samuel T. Tyson was a personal friend, living in Los Angeles and frequently with me. There were only 100 copies of his book and I have one of them. I tried to buy another from the printer, and am sorry that I did not use greater persuasive powers. Samuel gave me an unbound copy for my brother in Evanston; but I am afraid that it is packed away. Jonathan Tyson, his half-brother in Norristown, has one; and there is one in The Historical Society of Pennsylvania, and in L. A. Library. It has in it much interesting matter, tho a very small book. I have pictures of him, of Edwin Tyson and his wife; and of some of the Tyson houses, which he gave me. When you are ready I will have much to offer. I am not clear as to who owns Woodlawn Hall, but there is a book there; and here in Santa Ana, Calif., which has a picture of it and much valuable matter in it. Mrs. Wilson lived at Woodlawn, about

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1923, but I doubt if she is living now. Dr. James Lawrence Tyson, Neville's father, lived there, at one time, I believe; and at "Shady-side", near by. With my mother and little sister, I visited the Mathers there, in very early days. The property all belonged to Job Roberts, "The Pennsylvania Farmer"; and "for love and affection", he gave a part of it to Charles Mather, who married his daughter, Jane, the daughter of Mary Naylor Roberts, beside whose body Ann Trump Tyson rests, in Gwynedd Burial-Ground. I doubt if any of the Tysons are now living at Norristown, excepting Jonathan, who might be able to guide you. Those of Dr. James' family, who are living, are in Phila., or abroad, and with one exception, are not disposed to answer questions. I have pounded at them, with but little success; but still have hopes.

The Drinker book contains but little as to Neville, but I have copied what there is, and have asked for it again, to learn if there is anything of interest which I missed at first. I believe that there might be a book in the Norristown Historical Society.

Concord left London July 14, 1683 and arrived in Philadelphia on October 6, 1683

The number usually given is 89. This was the number of those who sailed from London on the Concord; but two infants were born at sea, and the mother of the De la Braeffs died in Philadelphia en route to the Germantown settlement.

It is of record that children of Aaron de la Braeff and Pieter (Lucas) were complained of, in the Germantown court, in 1701; and that children of Arents, (Willis, Densen and Luxens (as well as those of Pines and Peissen, who were born after 1683) attended school in Germantown between 1702 and 1703.

They arrived in Philadelphia on the 4th of October; on the 12th of that month Penn issued to them and Pastorius a warrant for 8,000 acres, one half of which was to go to them and one half to be reserved for the Frankfort Company; on the 24th, Penn's surveyor, Thomas Fairman, measured off for them fourteen plots of land in Germantown; and on October 23, 1683, the thirteen pioneer men, together with Francis Daniel Pastorius, met in a "log-cabin" cabin, the home of Pastorius on the banks of the Delaware in Philadelphia (on the present site of No. 102 South Front Street), and drew lots for the sites of their future homes.

There is a "certificate", bearing the date of 1702 and signed presumably by the seven survivors of "the original thirteen", which reads as follows (Watson's Annals, 1304 (1357), II, 13) "We whose names are to these presents subscribed, do hereby certify unto all whom it may concern, that soon after our arrival in the province of Pennsylvania, in October, 1683, to our certain knowledge Aaron de la Braeff, Dirck de la Braeff and Aaron de la Braeff, as well as ourselves, in the days of Francis Daniel Pastorius, at Philadelphia, did cast lots for the respective lots which they and we then began to settle in Germantown; and the said de la Braeffs (three brothers) have sold their several lots, each by himself, no less than if a Division in writing had been made of them. Witness our hands this 24th, November, A.D. 1702.

J. Schütz of Frankfurt, says he is living in Philadelphia, although his thoughts fly between that city and Germantown); but the thirteen pioneers immediately began to build their houses in the new settlement, and spent the following winter in them. It was the advice of Penn that they should not settle on large isolated farms, but that they should follow their ancestral custom of living together in a peasant and artisan village or town. This would greatly facilitate their social activities, especially the education of their children, in a new land without roads; and their own strong preference coincided with his advice.

There were three German families in Philadelphia in October, 1633, who desired to settle in Germantown; (Two of these families would appear to have been those of Jurian (or Jörg) Hartzfelier, a deputy-sheriff in Pennsylvania under Governor Andros in 1676, and Jacob Schumacher, formerly of Mainz; the third was perhaps that of the German-Swiss, Jörg Wertmüller.); and they as well as Pastorius and the Krefelders drew lots for home-sites in Germantown, on October 25 of that year.

In a letter to his parents dated from Philadelphia, the 7th of March, 1634, Pastorius states that "two hours from here, lies our Germantown, where already forty-two people live in twelve homes." This would imply that the thirty-four Krefelders, living in nine or ten homes, had been joined by two or three of the German families with their eight members.

Later in 1634, five more Krefelders arrived with their families, namely, Veit Scherkes, Wolter Siemes (Seimens), Jacob Pelner, Isaac Jacobs van Beber, and Herman Daurse. How many persons came with them is not known. But we know that Pelner brought with him his daughter Susanna; and we find in the Germantown records about 1700 the names of Anton and Johannes Scherkes (or Johannes, Scherkes) and Jacob Seimens (or Siemens), who may have been sons of David Scherkes and Wolter or Jan Siemes (Seimens); while as early as 1690 Isaac Jacobs van Beber held a meeting of Mennonites in his house. Hence it is probable that the Krefeld settlers of 1634 represented a company of at least 15 and perhaps 20 persons.

One year later (October 12, 1635), Hendrick Boekwolt (or Heinrich Buchholtz) and his wife, and Hans Peter Umstat, his wife Barbara, his son Johannes, and his daughters Anna Margaretha and Eva, joined the other Krefelders in Germantown. Between 1635 & 1690, Krefeld sent to Germantown Jacob Isaacs and Matthias Isaacs van Beber; Willem Hosters; Arent (or Arnold), Hermannus, Johannes and Paulus Koester (or Küster); Jan van Loverijn; Jan and Mattheis Neusz; Dirk, Hendrick and Martin Sellen (or Seelen); Jacob Seimens; and Jan Streysers. The records refer to wives and children of most of these fifteen later settlers; so that

they probably numbered about sixty, making a total of about 120 from Krefeld and Kaldekerk.

The second stream of pioneer settlers in Germantown came from Krisheim. The vanguard of these settlers arrived in October, 1685, and numbered 12 persons. These included three men (Gerhard Hendricks, Peter Schumacher and Heivert Papen, who, a bachelor at the time, later on in Germantown married Elizabeth, the daughter of Willem Rittinghuysen); two women (Maria and Sarah, the wives of Hendricks and Schumacher); and seven children (Sarah, Lambert and Willem, children of Gerhard Hendricks; and Peter, Mary, Frances and Gertrud children of Peter Schumacher).

The next year (in March, 1686), two more families, including 15 persons, came from Krisheim. The heads of these families were Johannes Kassel and his wife, and Sarah Schumacher, a widow; and their children were two sons and three daughters (Arnold, Peter, Elizabeth, Mary, and Sarah Kassel) and four sons & three daughters (Georg, Abraham, Isaac, Benjamin, Barbara, Susanna and Elizabeth Schumacher).

The migration of 27 pioneers from Krisheim nearly exhausted the spring; but during the next few years, we find in the Germantown records the names of four more men from Krisheim (Willem, Cornelis & Johannes Dewees, and Henry Kassel) and one from Flomborn, a neighboring village (Hendrik Pannebecker). These sent children to the Germantown school, and presumably brought their wives with them, thus adding to the population perhaps a score of persons, and making a total of about 52 from Krisheim and Flomborn.

Adding together the pioneer settlers in Germantown from 1688 to 1690, we find the population in the latter year to have been about 175, of whom all but eight or ten were Dutch.

Naturalization in 1691 and 1709

On the 7th of 3d Month, 1691, Thomas Lloyd, Deputy Governor of Pennsylvania, granted "naturalization" to 62 of the first settlers in Germantown, who were thereby made "free-men", a status which the law of England denied to foreigners. In return, they "solemnly promised faith and allegiance to William & Mary and fidelity and lawful obedience to William Penn as proprietary." The 62 naturalized in 1691 were these:
